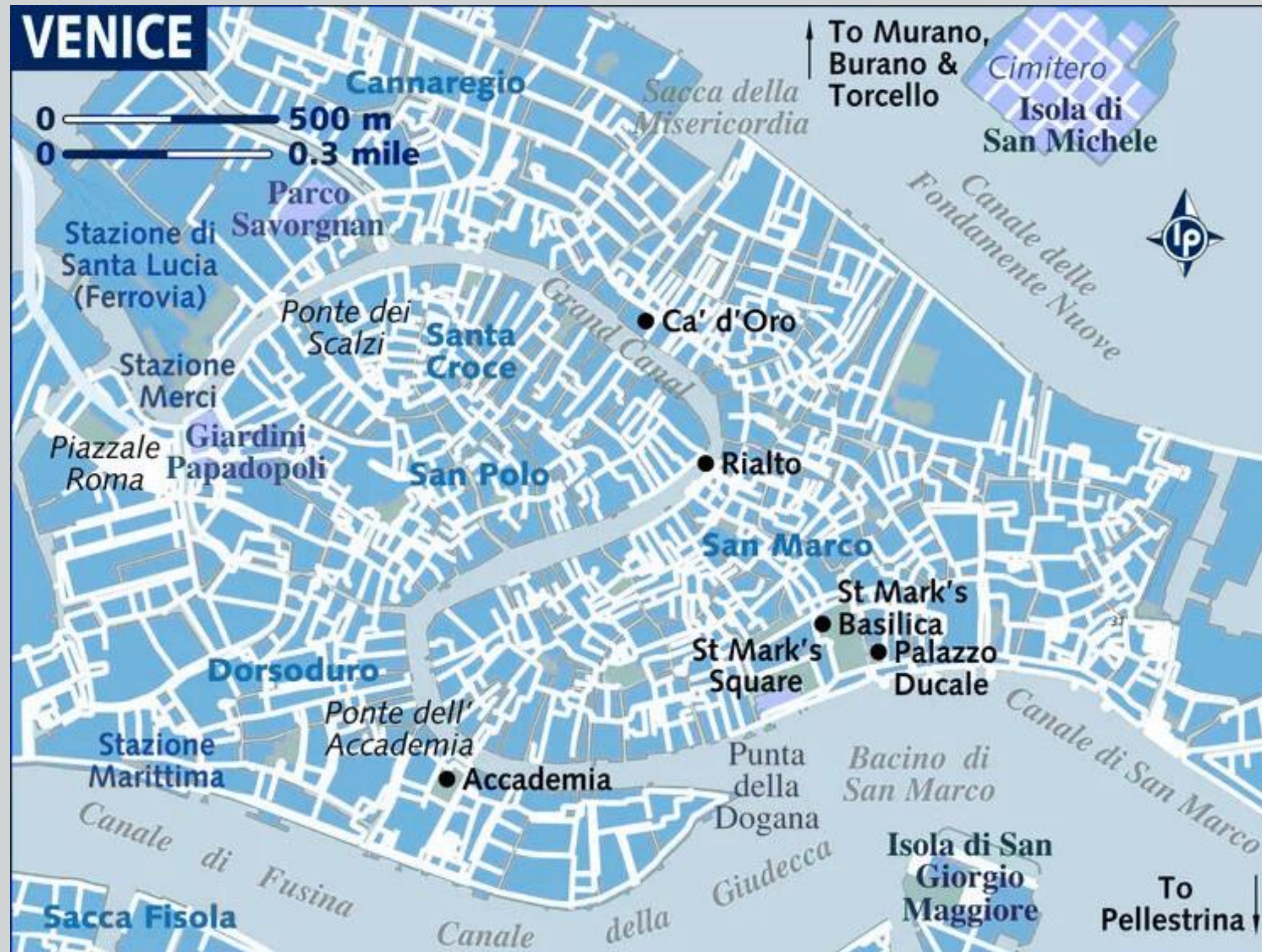

A 16th-century stone bridge spanning the Grand Canal, providing spectacular views and a remarkable example of Venice's engineering prowess.



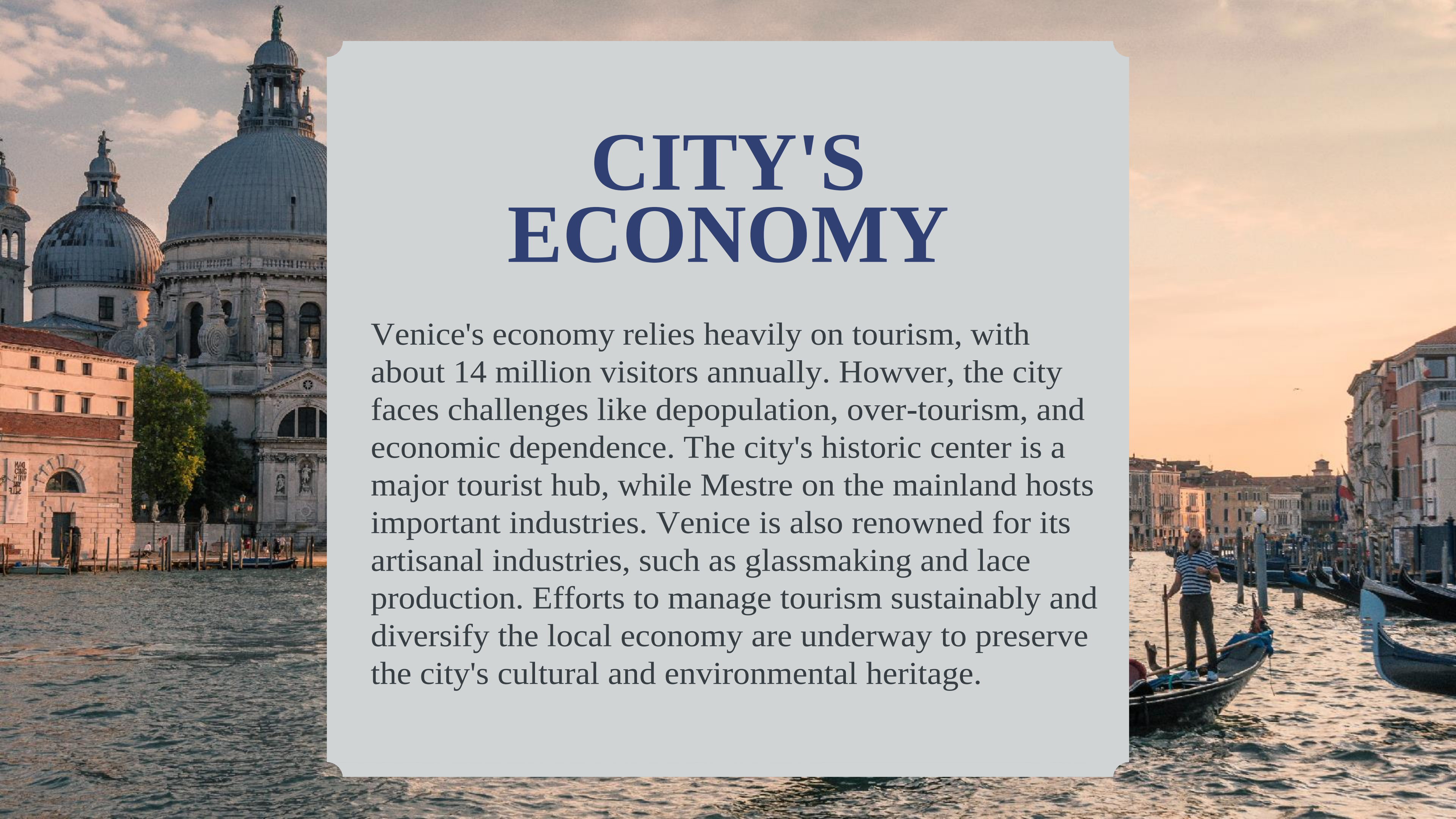
Doge's palace

In the 19th century things started to change again. The railway bridge of 1846 and the first Maritime Station in 1880 made the port modern. A big transformation came in 1917, with the creation of Porto Marghera. This industrial area, active from 1919, became very important for factories and trade.

In the 20th century, Venice's port became a key structure for the north of Italy. Today, it covers more than 2,000 hectares, with over 30 km of docks and many specialized terminals. Porto Marghera is the industrial and logistics part, while the Marittima area is for cruise ships and yachts. Venice is now one of the main cruise capitals of the Mediterranean.

In recent years, the port has worked on sustainability, digital tools, and efficiency. It continues to be a strategic entrance between Europe and the Mediterranean, mixing history, commerce, and tourism.
